HOUSES WITH A STORY TO TELL (9)

Continuing down Cow Lane,

No 8:

Henry Halker was a tenant here in July 1936 when his children were admitted to the school, having previously attended the Colliery Board School in Hebburn. According to the School However, Henry and wife Christina are both recorded on the 1939 Census and Henry's occupation was listed as 'coal miner'. Peggy Anne Drudge was admitted to the school in September John & Pat Hurndall (1960 - 1986) When we first moved to No 1943 whilst in the care of Mrs Boorman. She returned to Hayling Island School in January 1944. (School Admissions Register) Dud & Joy Ward were tenants here in the 1950s. Peter Slade became a tenant in October 1971 (LSA Bulletin No 1193) and was a Sidlesham Grower after the closure in 1983.

No 9:

Nicholas Greener and wife Ivy arrived from Newcastle in 1936. Their children attended Sidlesham School from September 1936, having previously attended Haworth School. The family moved to Selsey in 1937. 4 sons revisited the estate in 1996 (Chichester Observer) Jemina McIntosh came from Knowl Top (Yorkshire ?). Her children were admitted to the school in January 1938. The family left for Wisborough Green in June 1938. (Schools Admissions Register) Hugh & Olive McClay are recorded as smallholders on the 1939 Census and their son was admitted to the school.in January 1940. (School Admissions Register) No departure date. The Ogdens (no arrival date) were here in 1958 (LSA Bulletin No 528). On the Tenants Register in 1976, but no departure date. "On Monday we shall be having a demonstration on the cleaning out and trussing of a chicken given by Mrs (Molly) Ogden" (LSA Has your House got a Story to Tell? Bulletin No 528 1958).

Bob Hutchins was the tenant at the time of the closure in 1983 and became a Sidlesham Grower.

No 10:

William Ellson arrived in 1936. The School Admissions Register has no information about previous address - the family left for Shopwhyke, Chichester in August 1940. The 1939 Census records Noel & Agnes Baker as smallholders at No 10. Admissions Register the family left for London in June 1938. Douglas & Elsie Booth (1952-60) Douglas's brother Don was at No 15.

> 10 it was like the good life, we had the battery with approx. 40 chickens (they put my mother off eating chicken for years), the piggery - two pigs (Pinky and Perky) that had their litters; a jersey cow my mother used to make butter and I can remember having the thick cream on my cereal (totally unhealthy but delicious), the cow used to have one calf a year that either went in the freezer or to market. The chickens went first as they didn't pay. When we first lived there the lettuce were cut from 4am with a tilley lamp and the lettuce were put into wooden crates and put out for collection at 8 am. With the arrival of plastic bags lettuce could be cut all day and they then used electricity to cut them. I can remember a steam engine would arrive once a year to sterilise the soil in the greenhouses. During the winter of 1962/63 we supplied our neighbours with milk as the lane was cut off for quite a few weeks. We started off with a greenhouse and three bays of glass, before the storm of 1987 hit we had an acre of glass which was devastated in the storm and my parents decided to retire then. When working as a a librarian in Chichester, she met John Smart, whom she married, who was known to all Land Settlement home owners as the LSA maintenance man.


She was a leading light in the WI which she joined at the age of 18. She was President for many years and held other offices during her membership. She was also a leading light in the WI amateur dramatic group.

The end of summer and beginning of autumn is a time when we receive our most varied species of wildlife, from tiny birds to large deer, and everything in between! Thankfully, our dedicated team are well-trained and our growing site is well-equipped to treat a wide variety of these precious animals.

AVIAN FLU: Please call us on 01243 641672 (option 1) BEFORE picking up any birds so we can ask vital questions about the bird before taking action. We are still restricted regarding high-risk water birds but still please give us a call if you come across ANY sick/injured bird.

PATIENT STORIES

We recently admitted this beautiful juvenile sparrowhawk, after it was found by a passerby on a roadside.

Although very disgruntled, luckily he appeared to be fine and just required a place to rest and recuperate until old enough to fully fledge. He has several baby feathers left which will be replaced by beautiful brown adult feathers over the next couple of weeks. Following a few days in quarantine, he was moved to one of our flight enclosures and is getting on very well. We do not see many juvenile sparrowhawks in our care, especially ones so spirited, so treating this relatively healthy one has been a real pleasure.

does it ruin the landscape of our beautiful district, but it also poses an environmental risk and costs more than £350,000 of taxpayers' money to clear up every year.

One of the most important things you can do to help, is to make sure that anyone you employ to remove and dispose of your household waste is licensed as a waste carrier with the Environment Agency. By law, you are responsible for

any waste produced on your property — known as your 'duty of care.' It means that whether you've finished a DIY project; been clearing out unwanted household items; or have been busy sprucing up your garden, it's down to you to make sure that your waste is disposed of safely and legally.

If you ask someone to remove your waste, it's vital that you use a licensed waste carrier and ask for a waste transfer note as evidence. If you don't do this, and your waste is fly tipped by someone who is not licensed, you could receive a fixed penalty notice of up to £1000 for not disposing of your waste properly. The person who dumped the waste will also be fined.

You can check if a waste carrier is licenced by checking their waste carrier licence number on the Environment Agency's register by visiting their website at: https://

environment.data.gov.uk/public-register/view/index or calling: 03708 506506. If they do not have a licence, please make sure that you do not use them. If they are licensed and you use them, always ask what will happen to your waste and make sure that you get a waste transfer note and receipt for

your waste and keep these as proof. If you decide to get rid of your waste yourself, make sure that you take your waste to a registered site. You can find your neared site and its opening times at: www.westsussex.gov.uk/land-waste-and-housing/ waste-and-recycling

Another way you can help us, is by reporting any fly tipping, or any information you may have regarding one, at: www.chichester.gov.uk/flytipping. With your help, we have been able to take action against those who commit these crimes by issuing fixed penalty notices. We also have the option to prosecute the offender if further action is required.

THE ELUSIVE WRYNECK: JYNX TORQUILLAThe Elusive Wryneck: Jynx Torquilla

It's September, and in the bird world it's all go again. At Pagham,

the terns will be heading back to Africa to spend the winter in warmer weather where food is easier to find. Swifts, swallows and house-martins will also be heading south. You may see warblers, wheatears, yellow wagtails and perhaps even an osprey, as they pass through on to their way to their winter homes.

And September is the month when we start seeing our winter migrants often from the colder climates of Scandinavia, Russia and the Arctic. Some species of ducks and geese will be arriving, as well as some smaller visitors such as



fieldfares, redwings and bramblings who will find more abundant sources of nuts, berries and worms.

One bird to look out for is the beautiful yet elusive wryneck - a favourite amongst birders and, for a short period, a visitor to the Pagham and Church Norton areas. The wryneck is small woodpecker with a short beak and long tail, tending to sit in trees rather than climb up the trunk.

Perhaps it is the unusual plumage of these birds which makes them so popular. Their beautifully mottled brown and grey feathers form monochromatic patterns down their wings and tail, and a dark line which runs down their heads and bodies. This makes them very difficult to spot in trees or on the ground.

The wryneck has some incredible snake-like characteristics; not only do its elaborate patterns resemble the skin of a snake, it can also twist its neck around, hiss, and dart its long tongue when faced with predators. This relationship to the snake is embedded in its scientific name: *Jynx torquilla* and we can go all the way back to ancient Greece to find the connection.

The wryneck's serpentine characteristics are echoed in the name *torquilla* which refers to the twisting of the snake's

head. And like the symbolic snake, in Greek mythology, the wryneck was deeply entwined with the rituals of love and fertility. One such ritual involved the spreading of the wryneck on a wheel (known as a lynx) to be used in spells and charms to entice lovers.

The etymology of the word jinx as we know it today – a curse, or something attracting bad luck – comes from the Greek sorceress Lynx who was transformed into a wryneck as a punishment for a spell she cast on Zeus.

Wrynecks did once breed in the UK, and were prolific up until the mid-nineteenth century. Their slow, steady decline during the twentieth century has led to where we are now – for the last twenty years there have been no records of wrynecks nesting in the UK.

They often forage on shrub and grassland. Ants form the main part of their diet, but they also eat beetles, woodlice, and spiders, using their long tongues to scoop them up from the ground. It is believed that the loss of these habitats to agricultural farming and the use of pesticides have contributed to their extinction in the UK.

If you are lucky enough to spot one in this area, it is likely that it's passing through from breeding grounds in Europe to its winter home in Africa.

So, if you have found the summer all a bit a quiet in the bird world, now is the time to dust off your binoculars, head down to Pagham and try to spot a wryneck.




