The LSA House

As you know an LSA House (No 144) was dismantled in 2017 and is currently in storage at the Weald and Downland Living Museum.

I met with Simon Wardell, the Museum's Director, last week and here is the news we have all been waiting for:

The rebuild of the LSA House is now part of the museum's capital programme and a possible site has already been identified. All subject to funding of course, but this is very encouraging news - watch this space.

Once rebuilt the house will be a permanent home for the LSA story – not just Sidlesham, but all 20 LSAs which operated all over across the country.

Sidlesham Heritage Centre

Unfortunately this year we lost Len Doubledam (No 74). Len arrived on the LSA in 1975 from Holland and became a Sidlesham Grower at the closure in 198. He sold flowers from the roadside for a £1 a bunch for as long as anyone can remember, although the bunches did get smaller over time!
