

HOUSES WITH A STORY TO TELL (18)

There is a blue plaque in the village – the only one I am aware of – unless you know of another?

St. Mary's (adjacent to Florence's Pond)

Based on more than one estate agent description, this property may have 'previously been 3 alms houses to St. Mary's Church' with another reference to 'Tudor origins'. The present owners Lou and Andy McVean have also confirmed that there is clear evidence inside that the building may have originally been more than one house.

Previous owners include an Admiral Steiner, Hector Powe, Neville Duke, a Goodhew and John & Silvija Fry. An additional former resident was John G. Griffiths – recorded in Kelly's Directory in both 1911 and 1938. Another resident in the village may have been nanny to the family of Captain (Naval) Banks (?) at St. Mary's in the 1940/50s. Admiral Steiner (1916-98) entered the Royal Navy from St Paul's School (London) in 1935. He had an illustrious career, culminating as ADC to Queen Elizabeth II in 1965 and Assistant Chief to the Defence Staff in 1968. Sailing had always been his great passion and he lost little time on leaving the Navy in promoting and organising the Round the World Race, first sponsored by Whitbread in 1973. He died in 1988.

One of the oldest family-owned fashion houses in London, based in Regent Street, Hector Powe 'captured the essence of English luxury and style'. Launched in 1908 this famous brand's acclaimed journey includes two world wars and a ground breaking 20-year partnership with Burberry. In 2018 after a period of dormancy, the label was relaunched by Hector's great-grandnephew, Oliver Powe.

Neville Duke (1922-2007), subject of the Blue Plaque, had a remarkable record as a fighter pilot during the Second World War. He was decorated for gallantry six times by the age of 22. After the war, as chief test pilot for the Hawker Aircraft Company, he established a world airspeed record of 727.63 mph. He also has a blue plaque in Horsham where he lived for 2 years in 1962.

We believe that the reference to Goodhew is the uncle of Duncan, the gold medallist in the 100m Breaststroke at the 1980 Moscow Olympic Games. You may recall from a previous 'story' two other local Olympians, George Renwick at The Parsonage (Paris 1924) and David Campbell-James still at Church House (Los Angeles1984) - almost an Olympic village within Sidlesham!

## John & Silvija Fry (until 2007).

John had been in the RAF and known for being the last remaining Seafire pilot in World War Two. The Seafire was the naval equivalent of the more famous Spitfire, modified to operate from aircraft carriers.

Silvija Fry died earlier this year and her funeral took place at St. Mary's Church in Sidlesham. The on-line service includes the following extract from her eulogy . . . . "Which leads me to St. Mary's. Home of homes, with its occasional rodents. Stuffed with antiques collected from all corners of the globe. Cupboards filled to the brim with myriad colourful scarves and pashminas, enough tablecloths to open a shop and a fridge constantly fighting for food space amongst the array of bottles. We loved our St Mary's visits. It was a place to trip over dogs, chat with the chickens, admire the carefully tendered flowers and plants, try not to scold yourself with old hot water taps, and we're absolutely not going to mention the gaping hole in the thatched roof".

Lou and Andy McVean moved into St Mary's in 2007. Since which time their front wall deserves its own blue plaque, having been demolished three times by passing traffic...so far!

## **INSIDE THE WILDLIFE HOSPITAL IN JUNE**

Spring and Summer 2024 so far

have been incredibly busy here at Brent Lodge. We have had dozens upon dozens of baby admissions of all species. These babies have been found without their parents or in nests that have been disturbed by human or pet activity, and they need round-the-clock care to ensure their successful rehabilitation and growth before release back into the wild. We have also sadly begun seeing more patients being admitted with very nasty, and often life-threatening, injuries from lawnmowers and strimmers. We urge you to please check your long grass before cutting it back, as these excruciating injuries are very avoidable and you could be saving little lives by doing so. Please contact us if you come across any wild animal potentially in need, we are always here to help!

We have had multiple nests of baby blue-tits come in over the last few weeks that have been found alone and often hypothermic and incredibly hungry. Did you know, when these baby blue-tits first hatch, they are not much bigger than a 5 pence piece?! These babies initially need feeding every 10



## THE SONG OF THE SKYLARK

The meandering, lyrical beauty of the skylark's song is synonymous with summer days in the English countryside. It's a musicality which seems to nourish our senses like no other. Many of us will know the skylark for



its song rather than its looks - the small, dappled brown bird is often hovering high above us, in fact up to 300ft above, singing its song to both carve out its territory and attract a The collective noun for skylarks is an 'exaltation' - a mate.

There has been a long serving muse of poets: Shelley, Ted Hughes, Gerald Manley Hopkins, John Clare, Edward Thomas, Isaac Rosenberg and Emily Dickinson all found symbolism in the skylark; Chaucer and Shakespeare also made reference to these illusive little birds. But perhaps the most notable ode to the skylark is George Meredith's 'The Lark Ascending', the inspiration behind Vaughan Williams' tantalising score of the same name. In Meredith's 122 line To poem, the eight-syllable rhyming couplets emulate the paghamharbour repetitive, oscillating melody of the skylark's song: 'He rises and begins to round, / He drops the silver chain of sound, / Of

many inks without a break / In chirrup, whistle, slur and shake'. In Vaughan Williams' piece we hear this rhythm echoed in the short, recurring bursts of violin which feel light and playful, like the flight and song of the skylark.


Skylarks nest on arable land - generally in the middle of fields to avoid predators. They should produce up to three broods a year between April and August, but changes in farming practices have had a dramatic impact on their numbers. Since 1967 they have declined by 63% meaning they are now on the red list for conservation. In 2000 the RSPB opened Hope Farm in Cambridgeshire for the purpose of reconciling farming practices with habitat preservation. The good news is that, through this project, they have determined that skylark populations can be restored.





## **FLOWER FANCIES**

A watched Kettle never boils, and the

really surprise me as twenty years of records tell me this is the case, but every year I still check every day for weeks in advance! Stocks have just a short flowering season, three weeks, or four if I really push it and sell really tall stems the last week. As a lot are planted it's just as well they're so popular with the customers and that they're so quick to pick. The smell with a whole greenhouse full of them in today, and Stock next week. For the next month, the only bloom is phenomenal.

Diametrically opposite in almost every way are the Pinks, which are also coming into high season now. The season is long - up to 11 months, they're slow to pick/pack, and sell quite slowly. At the end of the day, the long season means that season's total number of bunches of Pinks is around twice that of Stocks. Whilst far more subtle, the Pinks are also very pleasantly scented. A challenge with Pinks is aphid and Thrip pests, either of which is capable of wiping out the whole crop. That is why I spend £50 every fortnight on Biological control. If you don't think you know what Thrips are, whilst Pinks are attacked by Western Flower Thrips, you will all Aart Dubbeldam know the Cereal Thrips, more commonly known as

Thunderbugs. Thrips are controlled by Predators, like miniature Lions after Antelope. Aphids are controlled by Parasites, the best example of which can be seen in the film same can be said of a watched flower - it Alien. It's just as well insects are so small, as seen under a never blooms! Daily checks of the microscope or knowing their biology they'd be terrifying on a Stocks not withstanding they're going to large scale! However, their size is limited by having at best a wait till the third week of May till rudimentary circulatory system, and as their bodies need they're ready to cut. That shouldn't oxygen just as much as ours do that means an absolute upper size limit. If insects ever evolve a heart, then be afraid – be very afraid!

> So, back to flowers. At the time of writing, 12<sup>th</sup> May, flowers are plentiful. Not just the Pinks are coming to their peak, but also the Alstroemeria. Statice and Double Sweet William start thing in short supply is hours in my day! Although they'll begin to tail off by then, no Stock, there'll still be plenty on 23<sup>rd</sup> June for the Allcomers Party that Wendy has kindly invited Dubbeldam Nurseries to. I'll bring flowers of course, probably bouquets, but I very much hope the customers will also take the opportunity to give me feedback. Positive comments are always welcome, but it's useful for me to hear how you think things can be done differently. Please though, no questions about garden plants as it'll just embarrass me when you find out how little I know about any plants other than commercial cut flowers!




